Our average cost for spay/neuter is \$225.00 each.

Dog abandonment

Last month, we explored the topic of separation anxiety in dogs. This time, we will focus on the connection between separation anxiety and abandoned dogs.

When a dog is abandoned on the street, it often experiences immediate distress and confusion as it finds itself in an unfamiliar environment. Many of these dogs will stay in the same spot, hoping their owners will return, only to become increasingly bewildered when they realize that this is not going to happen.

Once on the streets, these dogs face the challenge of surviving on their own, often struggling with hunger, thirst, injuries, and diseases due to a lack of knowledge about how to cope in such conditions. In animal shelters, dogs typically wait for their owners to come back, sometimes for several days. Gradually, they begin to understand that their owners are not returning. Research indicates that dogs can sense when they are nearing euthanasia, adding to their stress and anxiety during this vulnerable time.

Dogs are inherently social creatures that form deep bonds with their owners, which makes the experience of abandonment especially traumatic. Even when left at boarding facilities, dogs can experience varying levels of stress and anxiety. However, the key difference is that boarding facilities often provide care, attention, and love from staff members, helping to alleviate some of the anxiety. If you need to leave your dog at a boarding facility, it's essential to choose a reputable place that will ensure your pet feels safe and cared for while you are away.
